In 2013, six African American families responded to a Heritage Fund challenge to establish a new endowment fund. The African American Fund was created with this vision for the future:

Scholarships

Recognizing the vital role education plays in the success of our young individuals, we have introduced four scholarship programs over the past five years, three of which have been locally implemented. To date, we have proudly awarded scholarships to 33 exceptional students.

We aspire to increase the level of scholarship awards in the coming years to ensure a brighter future for even more deserving recipients.

Grants

In addition to scholastic schlarships, the AAFBC also awards grants to special education opportunities.

Co-sponsored two African American Columbus East students to a leadership conference in San Diego in 2016.

Co-sponsored a student from Indiana University to attend a nursing exchange program in London 2023.



Columbus Enrichment Program

The Columbus Enrichment Program provides free tutoring and diverse programming to support students. With dedicated educators and volunteers, it empowers academic excellence while fostering personal growth through engaging activities, enriching the lives of local youth and building a sense of community.

LEGO Robotics STEM Camp Hosted by Paths to Success

AAFBC has been the primary sponsor of the LEGO Robotics program since its inception, providing crucial resources and instruction through the Purdue Polytechnic Advanced Manufacturing Center. In the past three years, we had the privilege of hosting 80 African American students, and we are proud to report that our attendance is steadily increasing, including a 15% return rate among students. In 2023, we expanded our offerings by introducing an advanced Robotics class, catering to the aspirations of emerging engineers within our program.

Historical Black Colleges and Universities Fair

Every year, 44 Historical Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) convene at Indianapolis' Crispus Attucks High School, attracting over 500 attendees dedicated to enhancing the prospects of African American students. Students from Columbus North, East, and Signature Academy explore scholarships and engage with on-site representatives, expanding their higher education options. This year three of the 16 students who attended received scholarships on-the-spot.

Arts & Culture

The Arts and Culture Initiative focuses on supporting Afrocentric entertainment, providing access to local, regional, national, and international forums, speakers, and issues, as well as promoting educational opportunities that broaden youth cultural awareness activities.





Black History Month Columbus 2023

Black History Month Columbus was established in 2023 to celebrate Black culture, share authentic history, and honor the legacy of our local Black community. Over 50 events in February included a historical exhibit and tour spotlighting the resilience of Black Bartholomew County residents. The mayor officially declared February "Black History Month Columbus" during the opening of "And Still We Rise," an exhibit at The Commons detailing the community's history. Moreover, the Black History Month Columbus won the Jurgemeyer Community Leadership Project of the Year Award, securing a \$15,000 grant for its remarkable contributions.

The Soul of Philantrophy 2019

The African American Fund of Bartholomew County celebrated local African American philanthropy in "The Soul of Philanthropy" exhibit, honoring around 60 individuals, from early residents to present-day activists. The mayor of Columbus proclaimed August as "Black Soul of Philanthropy Month" during the event, acknowledging the African American community's remarkable contributions and generosity in Bartholomew County.

Exhibit locations included Bartholomew County Public Library, Central Middle School, Columbus East High School, Columbus North High School, CSA Lincoln Elementary School, Columbus Learning Center, Fair Oaks Mall, and The Commons. Columbus Community Film Series

films exploring ethnicity, faith, race, age, and gender. "CROSSROAD STORIES" highlighted the experiences of people of color in small Midwest communities. This festival encouraged ongoing dialogues and enjoyed support from various organizations, including CAMEO, Council for Youth Development, First Presbyterian Church, and more community partners.

Juneteenth

The Black Lives Matter movement pushed Juneteenth into the national spotlight, leading to its designation as a federal holiday in 2021. The local annual downtown Juneteenth celebration attracted over 300 attendees and featured music, dance performances, and local Black-owned business booths.

Black History Month Jazz Performance

"Feel the Vibe," a captivating jazz concert headlined by renowned pianist Christopher Pitts from Indianapolis, was a highlight of Black History Month Columbus 2023. This event celebrated Black culture and the Black community's accomplishments, encouraging neighbors from all backgrounds to join in a meaningful, educational experience promoting community healing.



The Langston Hughes Project

We collaborated with the Granny Connection to receive a Heritage Fund grant in support of "The Langston Hughes Project - Ask your Mama - 12 Moods for Jazz." In 2016, Ron McCurdy, along with his jazz quartet from the University of Southern California and our own Marja Harmon, shared with us a night to remember in celebration of Black History month. In the spirit of elevating community inclusivity, this was an opportunity to broaden awareness, educate, and foster an appreciation of Black heritage through visual illumination, poetry, and music.



Leadership Development

Talent development is critical both to our vision and the long-term viability of our foundation. As such, we have sponsored many young adult's participation in programs such as Leadership Bartholomew County (LBC), United Way's Board Boot Camp, and Dale Carnegie's Leadership Training. Additionally, we have mentored and provided opportunities for budding leaders to flourish.

For our youth, Paths to Success partners with the Center for Leadership Development (CLD) in Indianapolis to provide experiences that encourage personal development, educational attainment and leadership. In the past year, more than 50 students have broadened their horizons through participating in CLD programs.

Our instrumental role in co-establishing the TIME (Targeted Investment in Minority Entrepreneurs) Program with Cummins has advanced over 30 Black and Latino businesses in Bartholomew County, contributing more than \$500,000 in support, including grants, microloans, legal, accounting, marketing, and administrative assistance.

In partnership with Cummins Inc., we have organized multiple networking events to facilitate over 150 people to attend and make connections among African and African American professionals residing and working in the region.




